Help Restore Pollinator Habitats One Book at a Time

Buglife is the only organisation in Europe that dedicates its work to the conservation of all invertebrates, including bees, butterflies, spiders and other creatures vital to maintain our ecosystem. Discussion Topics

Read the book together, asking questions throughout.

- 1. Look at the cover of the book together. What do you think the story might be about?
- 2. Who is speaking on the first spread of the story?
- 3. What do you know about bees? Do you agree with Noah that bees don't live in apartments? Where do they live?
- 4. What is Grandpa's plan? Does it work?
- 5. Why do you think Grandpa prepares the special meal for the bee?
- 6. What is Grandpa's book about? Do you agree with his statement, 'Reading makes the waiting easier.'?
- 7. What does the bee eventually do?
- 8. What do you think the bee sees on its way home? What are all the children doing? Have you done any of these things? See activity Create a Wall of Kindness
- 9. What's Noah's idea? What do you think about it?
- 10. Read the facts on the last spread. Did you know any of them?
- 11. What do you think about the things you can do to help bees carry out their job safely? Are you going to do any of them?
- 12. What do you think about this story? What sort of message is being given?
- 13. What did the children think of the book? If they liked it, why did they like it? What was their favourite part?









Create a Wall of Kindness

The book features a list of actions that can be taken to help create a pollinator-friendly environment. But there are even more examples of kind actions that can be found in the book. The illustrations show children cleaning up rubbish, donating books to a library, recycling old items, installing a bird house, creating a wall of kindness, to name a few. Noah gets inspired by seeing these actions to do more and decides to plant seeds around town to help grow a bee corridor.

Cut out the below template or draw a silhouette around your hand and then add in one kind action that you have either taken or intend to take. After everyone in your class has done this, the teacher can display them on the wall.



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









Bumblebee life cycle


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
